# **HIGHLIGHTS**

# A Diverse, Dynamic Incoming Class

The largest and most selective incoming class in the university's history attended Northwestern Qatar's 15th convocation ceremony. More than 120 students representing more than 25 nationalities listened to addresses by Dean Kraidy; Caroline Faraj, vice president and editor-in-chief of CNN Arabic Services; and Khadija Ahmad, president of the Northwestern Qatar Student Government (NUQSG). Faraj's message to the students: "Today is a foundation for lifelong learning."

### **Our First Rhodes Scholar**

William Gitta Lugoloobi '23 became the first student from Northwestern Qatar to be selected for a Rhodes Scholarship, one of the most prestigious academic scholarship programs in the world. Gitta Lugoloobi plans to investigate computational propaganda in Uganda, his home country. At Northwestern Qatar, he co-founded the Data Science Club and worked as a software engineer intern at the Qatar Computing Research Institute.

### A Transformative Grant

A \$350,000 grant from Carnegie Corporation of New York will allow Northwestern Qatar to expand the field of Arab Information and AIMS over the next two years. The grant will also support a collaboration between AIMS and the Security in Context network, a global initiative promoting critical research and policy analysis on peace and conflict. Said Dean Kraidy: "Our project will catalyze a qualitative leap in regional knowledge production on Arab media and connect regional research to global networks."

# **Inspiring Conversations**

Leaders from academe, the media, the arts, and public affairs joined Dean Kraidy in conversation at the Dean's Global Forum. Gita Manaktala, editorial director of the MIT Press, discussed the future of academic publishing. Prathama Banerjee, professor at the Centre for the Study of Developing Societies in Delhi, explored politics and the Global South. Ayman Mohyeldin, journalist and host of MSNBC's weekly primetime show Ayman, addressed identity and global reporting.

### A Memorable Graduation

Northwestern Qatar's Class of 2023—comprising more than 110 students representing more than 32 cultures and countries—celebrated their achievements at the university's graduation ceremony. They were addressed by Dean Kraidy; Aesha Hussein, Class of 2023 student speaker; and Hassan Al Thawadi, secretary general of the Supreme Committee for Delivery and Legacy for the 2022 FIFA World Cup. "Find your passion and let it drive you towards your goals and dreams," said Al Thawadi. "Let it take you to places you did not think were possible."

# **New Leadership Appointments**

Four new academic leaders were appointed to advance the university's academic mission: Zachary Wright, associate dean for faculty affairs; Maria Lombard, assistant dean for academic affairs; Venus Jin, director of the Communication Program; and Gregory Ferrell Lowe, director of the Executive Education Program. "I am confident their expertise and leadership will help take our academic programs to new heights," said Dean Kraidy.

# **New Faculty Hires**

Eight new professors were hired, enhancing the university's academic profile. The professors include researchers and scholars in media industries, gender studies, cultural politics, and performance studies, as well as the school's first Qatari professor. Leila Tayeb and Heather Jaber have joint appointments in the Communication Program and the Liberal Arts Program. Fatima El-Issawi, Claudia Kozman, and Marda Dunsky join the Journalism and Strategic Communication Program. Haya Al-Noaimi, Yasmeen Mekawy, and Jana Fedtke join the Liberal Arts Program.

# **Collaborations in Education City**

Collaborations with institutions in Education City expanded the university's academic reach. In conjunction with VCUarts Qatar and the Doha Film Institute, a new joint minor program in film and design was established. This year's Doha Seminar explored connections between Islamic thought, philosophy, and practice in the region. The course was co-taught by Zachary Wright from Northwestern Qatar and Patrick Laude, professor of religious studies at Georgetown University in Qatar.

### One Book

As part of the university's One Book program, Pakistani American writer Usman T. Malik joined a community discussion about his novel *Midnight Doorways: Fables from Pakistan*. The novel, which won the Crawford Award, features a series of seven illustrations and horror stories drawn from fables, histories, and life in present-day Pakistan.

# **Leadership in Communication**

Dean Kraidy was elected as the 2023–2024 Chair of the Fellows at the International Communication Association (ICA), one of the most prestigious international associations for communication scholars and researchers. Elected every year by more than 250 fellows from around the world, the Chair of the Fellows acts as a representative of the fellows and spearheads initiatives across the wider ICA and global communication scholarly communities.

# **Pulitzer Center Screening**

At a special event hosted through a partnership with the Pulitzer Center on Crisis Reporting, filmmakers and Pulitzer Center reporting fellows Phil Cox and Rafa Renas recounted their experience producing The 'Spider-Man' of Sudan: the real-life superhero of the protest movement. After a screening of the film, Cox and Renas described the process of filming the documentary in the midst of political turmoil.

# **Hiwar Speaker Series**

Leaders in a range of fields addressed pressing issues in the Hiwar Speaker Series. Abeer Buhelaiqa, founder of the Qatar Women Engineers Association; Ghada Salama, a chemical engineering professor at Texas A&M University at Qatar; and Northwestern Qatar professor Anto Mohsin talked about women in science and engineering. Ramona S. Diaz, a Peabodyand Emmy-award-winning Asian American filmmaker, screened and talked about her film A Thousand Cuts, which examines the tensions between the government and the press in the Philippines.

# **Executive Education Masterclasses**

Two new masterclasses in the Executive Education Program offered media and communication professionals an inclusive, immersive learning experience that combines academic modules and industry expertise. The classes focused on strategic communication with stakeholders and social media strategy, tools, and analytics.

# **Africana Studies Lecture**

A lecture by Zekeria Ahmed Salem, associate professor of political science at Northwestern University, examined the outsized global influence of Mauritanian Islamic scholars, religious texts, and institutions of learning. Salem's lecture, "Mauritanian Scholars on the World Stage: From 'Desert Archive' to Global Islamic Authority," was hosted by the Africana Studies Committee at Northwestern Qatar.

# Research

# **Qatar Research Grants**

Faculty and researchers were awarded grants from major foundations in Qatar: the Qatar National Research Fund and the Qatar Foundation's (QF) Education City Innovation in Teaching Grant program. # **Faculty Scholarship**

Faculty continued to produce important scholarship and research. They published five books, seven book chapters, and more than two dozen journal articles. Nineteen were awarded grants; 56 gave talks at conferences or academic gatherings.

# National Endowment for the Humanities Grant

Professor Spencer Striker received a Digital Projects for the Public Grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities. The grant supports the development of "The People Who Created 'America's City' (New York 1770-1800)," an interactive learning experience for middle and high school students. Professor Striker will lead a team of historians, advisors, secondary school partners, and museums to design materials that help students understand the complex problems and choices faced by New Yorkers during the Revolutionary War.

# **#IAS\_NUQ Conferences**

At two conferences hosted by the Institute for Advanced Study in the Global South at Northwestern Qatar (#IAS\_NUQ), leading scholars considered the meaning and function of "Global South" and the impact of digital culture on the region. "What is the Global South? Histories, Epistemologies, and Solidarities" examined "what the notion of 'Global South' does, what it enables, and what it forecloses," said Dean Kraidy. "Southern Digitalities" explored the impact of digital tools, experiences, and articulations in the Global South.

# #IAS\_NUQ Global Undergraduate Fellows

Through its Global Undergraduate Fellowship program, #IAS\_NUQ supported the work of 16 promising student researchers. This year's fellows plan to study topics including consumption and identity in Qatar; the music industry in Zambia; gender, feminism, and mobility in Pakistan; legacies of countercultures in Nepal, and freedom of expression in Kazakhstan.

# #IAS\_NUQ Global Postdoctoral Scholars

Three new #IAS\_NUQ Global Postdoctoral Scholars began their residencies on campus, conducting research on the Global South.

Mariam Karim examined Arabic mass media in the context of media imperialism and colonialism. Harsha Man Maharjan explored the social, political, technological, and economic implications of smart cards in Nepal. Chafic Tony Najem studied prisoners' illicit media practices and the use of smuggled digital media technologies in carceral spaces, with a focus on Lebanon.

# **Experiential Learning**

Dozens of students participated in two experiential learning programs. In the Service Learning Experience, students traveled to Laos to help community members in rural Luang Prabang build a school for children. In the Global Media Experience, students traveled to the United Arab Emirates, where they explored media sites and met with experts from industry leaders, including Asharq News, CNN Arabic, and Ogilvy.

### **Media and Research Awards**

Ten student projects—including a report on Arabic fluency among Qatari youth, an investigation of racism and technology, and a documentary about the 1947 partition of India and Pakistan—were recognized at the university's annual Media and Research Awards. Winners were chosen from more than 140 submissions—a record high—and evaluated by a panel of judges from organizations such as Al Jazeera, Katara Studios, Qatar Media City, and Ogilvy.

# Studio 20Q Premiere

Six films produced by Northwestern Qatar students and graduates were shown at the Studio 20Q Premiere, an annual red-carpet event drawing students, faculty, and industry professionals from across Education City and Doha. The films were funded by Studio 20Q, the university's student-run film club.

# **Summer Internships**

More than 45 students completed summer internships, including 17 journalism students who took an internship as part of the university's Journalism Residency program. Students developed communication campaigns at Qatar-based nonprofit Education Above All Foundation, produced documentaries at Al Jazeera English, and contributed to podcasts and created advertising campaigns for Casa del Podcast in Tarragona, Spain.

# New Issue of Wisteria

The latest issue of *Wisteria*, an online literary journal produced by students, was launched at a community open mic. The theme of the issue was "Who Are You?" In their work—including poetry, fiction, art, photography, cartoons, literary translations, and essays—students explored identity and what it means to be human in a digital world.

# **Purple Fest**

This year's Purple Fest showcased students' Wildcat Spirit. The annual community celebration featured a talent show, cultural food, and e-games, as well as activities sponsored by student clubs. The event was organized by the Northwestern Qatar Student Government, NUQSG.

# Kwibuka29

Kwibuka29, a community event commemorating the more than 1 million Tutsi who lost their lives during the 1994 genocide in Rwanda, drew students and faculty members. Hosted by the African Students Association, the event featured a screening, speeches by students, and talks by Igor Marara, His Excellency the Ambassador of Rwanda to Qatar, and Tom Ndahiro, a Rwandan researcher who specializes in genocide ideology and genocide denial.

# **Last Lecture**

This year's Last Lecture, a highlight of the university's end-of-year ceremonies, was delivered by Scott Curtis, associate professor in the Communication Program. In his lecture "Everything I Know, I Learned from the Movies," Curtis drew life lessons from films he taught in a class that students had taken in their first year at the university. Curtis told students to hold on to their memories and believe in themselves as they continue to grow after graduation.

# **New Operations Leadership**

Two new leaders "will be instrumental in ensuring operational support for Northwestern Qatar's upward trajectory," according to Dean Kraidy. James Shaw, associate dean for administration and chief operations officer, will help develop and implement institutional strategies and professional practices that support excellence. David Donaghue, director of business and finance, will oversee a range of tasks, including budget planning, internal policy compliance, and maintenance of auditing standards.

# Recognition for The Media Majlis

The Media Majlis at Northwestern Qatar expanded its influence in the region and beyond. In November 2022, it became the first museum in the Middle East to be accredited by the American Alliance of Museums. In May 2023, Jack Thomas Taylor, associate curator and interim director of The Media Majlis, was selected as a member of the board of the International Council of Museums' branch in Qatar, ICOM Qatar.

# **LEED Platinum Certification**

Northwestern Qatar's building in Education City was awarded LEED Operations and Maintenance (O+M) Platinum certification, a globally recognized symbol of sustainability. "This achievement is a testament to our commitment to environmental stewardship," said Ray Corcoran, the university's director of facilities.

# **Hosting the Doha Debates**

The Doha Debates, a flagship series produced by the Qatar Foundation and Endeavor's Film 45, was filmed at Northwestern Qatar. In front of a live studio audience, host Mo Amer and a panel of celebrities and experts sought common ground on important global issues.

# Is it a beautiful game?

An interactive exhibition at The Media Majlis, *Is it a beautiful game?*, explored the social and political effects of football and its interrelationship with the media. The exhibition was supplemented by several public programs, including discussions on environmental sustainability in sports, the growth of e-sports, and inequality and discrimination in sports, as well as a special screening of *The Workers Cup*, a film about the lives of migrant workers who built Qatar's World Cup infrastructure.

# **All About Musalsalat**

Two leading scholars discussed the business of serialized Arab television dramas at an event hosted by The Media Majlis. Shahd Alshammari, assistant professor at Gulf University for Science and Technology, and Firat Oruc, associate professor at Georgetown University in Qatar, explored the cultural and economic significance of the dramas in front of a crowd of students and faculty.

# 2022 FIFA World Cup

This was a year of competition at the highest level. As Qatar hosted the World Cup, the university community engaged with a broad range of interconnected issues: football, culture, economics, politics, journalism, and more. # **Sports Journalism Conference**

Journalists, filmmakers, writers, and radio hosts from South America, the Middle East, Africa, and Asia attended a conference keyed to the World Cup. "Sports Journalism & The 2022 World Cup: Views from the South" explored the interrelationship between football, journalism, and sports in the Global South.

# Students and Alumni at the World Cup

Many of the university's students and alumni were integral to the production and coverage of the tournament. Shaden Wahdan '17, a producer at Alkass Sports Channels, covered games and activities around the country. Annastazia Ng'ambi '24 completed a broadcasting internship at FIFA Legacy. Lieutenant Majed Al Naimi '20, a public relations officer in Qatar's Ministry of Interior, helped to develop a public safety communications strategy.

# **Faculty World Cup Research**

Faculty engaged in research projects examining the social and cultural effects of the 2022 FIFA World Cup in the region. Professors Craig LaMay, Susan Dun, and S. Venus Jin are leading projects that examine the relationship between politics and sports media piracy in the region, Qatar's use of virtual reality technology to promote its tournament, and media coverage of Qatar in the years since it was named host of the World Cup.

# More Than a Cup

Scholars on Northwestern's campuses in Qatar and Evanston participated in a special event about the social and cultural effects of football on the Arab world. Hosted by the Office of the Provost at Northwestern University, "More Than a Cup: Outside the Touchlines of the 2022 FIFA World Cup" featured panel discussions, podcasts, and film screenings.

# **#IAS\_NUQ Panel**

The Institute for Advanced Study in the Global South sponsored Sports in the Global South, a panel discussion featuring scholars from around the world. Panelists examined the relationship between sports, cultures, and communities in the Global South.
